



A Conversation with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

The third Monday in January was set aside to commemorate the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. His life began on January 15, 1929, and I have often wondered what this 90 year old man, an icon of the Civil Rights Movement, would say to us today?

I would imagine that Dr. King would profess his beliefs, which are rooted in the word of God, expounding on how the prophets, Jesus, and the apostles left their homes to spread the good news of salvation. He would compare his goings and comings to "responding to the Macedonian call for aid and carrying the gospel of freedom." Dr. King would tell us to stay vigilant in the call for justice. He would reminisce about the time he and others were placed in jail in Birmingham, Alabama, on April 16, 1963, for nonviolent demonstrations against segregation. While in jail, he wrote a letter in response to a public statement made by eight white religious leaders who called the nonviolent demonstrations "unwise and untimely." He would then remind us of a statement he made in this letter, "I cannot sit idly by in Atlanta and not be concerned about what happens in Birmingham. Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere."

From the Birmingham jail, Dr. King would then have us project our imaginations forward to August 28, 1963, as he stood on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial before some 250,000 people. This 90 year old preacher in his eloquent voice would ask us this question: Is the promissory note of equality and justice paid in full, or have you fallen behind in your payments? He would convey to us that in order for freedom to ring, we must be accountable to each other to guarantee that the promissory note of equality and justice is paid in full. In order for freedom to ring, he would proclaim to us that we must walk this walk together, not alone. In order for freedom to ring, we must "speak the truth in love, so that we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of Him who is the head, that is, Christ. From Him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work." (Ephesians 4:15-16, paraphrased) When we have done these things for the remaining days of this life, only then will we be able to say, "Free at last, Free at last, Thank God almighty, we are free at last."

As our time with Dr. King comes to a close, I imagine that through his thoughts, we are transported to the evening of April 3, 1968. We are in Memphis, TN, sitting in Mason Temple, looking up at this great orator as he speaks to the people for the last time. Dr. King came because of the refusal of Memphis to be fair and honest in its dealings with its public servants, the sanitation workers. He came to Memphis because there was injustice here. There is still injustice here. Imagine now that Dr. King is at the Church of Christ at White Station. As he stands in front of our entire church body - what would he say? I believe he would remind us that he has seen the promised land but that we are not there yet. He would say, "Yes we have made some progress on the journey to that land where all people are treated as equals in every way, but we must walk the path of integrity." He would tell those in our church who are currently being oppressed not to give up, to remember all of those who walked this road before them.

We must walk the path of long-suffering. He would tell those in our church who have power, not to stand silently and watch injustice happening right in front of them but to stand up and say "No more!" We must walk the path of courageousness. He would implore those who understand they are privileged to speak hard truths about racial justice to other privileged people. We must walk the path of righteousness.

"We've got some difficult days ahead. But it really doesn't matter with me now, because I've been to the mountaintop. Like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has it place But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And I've seen the Promised Land."
